# The Point



aikipia University was well represented in this year's Rift Valley Region University Drama festivals held at the School of Government (SoG) in Kabarnet Baringo County on 7th and 8th March 2019. The University was represented by Laikipia University drama troupe popularly known as the Laikipia Travelling Theatre or LTT. Also present at the event were Moi University, Mount Kenya University (Nakuru Campus), Baraton University, and Evangelical Highlands University (Kericho). Laikipia University competed in 8 categories that included a play, solo verse, choral verse, narrative, modern dance, mime, comedy, and spoken word. In all the categories our University qualified for the next stage National Drama Festivals which will be held at Kibabii University in early April 2019. 3 items scooped the first position, 4 items second position while one item got the third position. The mime, modern dance and comedy got position one, the play, solo verse, narrative and spoken word got position two while the choral verse scooped the third award. The troupe also managed to scoop other awards for best costume, best production, original productions and adjudicator's awards. The presentations by the group at SoG in Kabarnet comes shortly after the team participated as guests at the Laikipia County Drama Festivals that were held at Marmanet Secondary School a week ago. The team was led by Prof. Nabea who wrote directed all the productions with the assistance of Mr. Obwanga Benson and Mr. Emmanuel Obare an M.A student in the Department of LITCOMS. Production of items for the drama festivals is a very expensive endeavor given the hundreds of thousands of shillings that goes into costume and decor, travelling, directing and production. For this reason the group is very grateful to the Laikipia University Management for availing funds and for also finding time to watch and critic the productions. The group is also grateful for the University Management for providing this platform for the students to nurture their talents which will go a long way in providing a spring board for their future endeavors.

They are an integral part of the Counseling Section. Peer Counselors reach out to their fellow students through mentorship forums, social support groups and individual counseling. The group plays a key role in identifying and referring complicated counseling cases such as suicidal tendencies, depression, psychological disorders among other issues that require attention

from the Students Counselors. Currently there are 40

trained peer counselors.



The day was organized by the Counseling Section under Students Affair Department to sensitize the students on accessibility of the Counseling services in the University. The Peer Counselors' Day activities included:

- •Sensitizing students on negative effects of drug use and substance abuse
- •Encouraging students to seek Counseling services

- 3. Dr. Barnabas Kurgat-Promoting Sustainable Intensification of African Indigenous Vegetables in Kenya It is of paramount importance that young researchers feel inspired and engaged by our diverse discipline. The University considers it a prime objective to offer a platform for researchers to meet up, present and discuss their work.



he Giant sponge, also known as Neptune's cup, due to its cup-shaped structure, is an unusually massive marine animal with no skeleton and a soft porous body. This sounds like a fairy tale, right? Nevertheless, scientists claim that it was first discovered in 1822 and due to their popularity, was once used by mothers to bath their children among other uses led to their overharvesting until they were completely extinct. This sounds really sad! However, the last of its kind was last spotted in 1907 in west Java, Indonesia, though they are claims that it has been recently rediscovered off the coast of Southern Singapore, more than a century when it was last seen. Back to the basics now, another mightier sponge, "Wetlands", faces extinction. Wetlands are ecosystems like lakes, rivers, marshes and peatlands. They act as 'Giant sponges 'that soaks up and stores extra rainfall and water from the storm surges. Wetlands have a myriad of functions ranging from feeding downstream waters, recharging ground waters, removing pollution, providing habitat for fish and other aquatic animals. Besides, they can also be key drivers of local economies, ranging from agricultural, recreational and fishing activities. However, experts warns that the world's wetlands are disappearing at an alarming rate, faster than our tropical forests. Recent studies by global wetland convention, Ramsar, found nearly 3% of world's wetlands were lost between 1970 and 2015. To safeguard all these benefits, International Wetland Agreement on conservation and sustainable use of wetlands advocated countries to put standards on wetland management, restoration and protection. Kenya being a signatory to the convention, with six Ramsar sites of international importance, has much yet to be done to realize their sustainable uses. Owing to the recent campaign on Big four Agenda, the four pillars expected to accelerate economic growth, environmental issues are yet to be featured in economic development plans yet it's the engine that silently drives the economy. There is therefore need to balance trade, environment and development for sustainability as recommended by the World Commission on Environment and Development.

However, the recent National Environmental Management Authority (NEMA) initiative on Adopt – a River Initiative, which is aimed at strengthening links between curricula and sustainability issues in Kenya, may perhaps steer the country towards this goal. The initiative empowers students at middle and higher training institutes to adopt a nearby River, monitor its pollution levels and undertake its restoration and conservation. Laikipia University being endowed with such resources, is in the process of adopting its watershed hence this will go a long way in the realization of sustainable environments both locally, nationally and globally and maybe with other initiatives in place, the history ought not repeat itself!!!!
