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EMPOWERING STUDENTS: SCHOOL OF HUMANITIES AND DEVELOPMENT STUDIES CAREER ADVISING FORUM

The School of Humanities and Development Studies (SHDS) organized a Student Advising Forum for its students on 4th March, 2025, at the Nelson Mandela Hall. The event, an initiative of Prof. Sheila Pamela Wandera-Simwa, the Academic Dean of SHDS, was well-attended by both staff and students. The forum was officially opened by Prof. John Kanjogu, the Acting Deputy Vice Chancellor for Academic, Research, and Student Affairs (DVC ARSA).

In his opening remarks, Prof. Kanjogu highlighted the critical importance of student advising and praised the school for initiating the forum. He expressed appreciation for the strong faculty attendance, noting it reflected a genuine commitment from the academic staff. He also observed that student participation was impressive, with the hall reaching full capacity.

The keynote address, titled "Academic Mentorship for a Transformative Agenda," was delivered by Prof. James Onyango Ogola, a senior faculty member at the university. Prof. Ogola encouraged students to reflect on the University's vision, "Nurture and Transform for the World," and aspire to become responsible global citizens equipped with both technical and soft skills. He posed a thought-provoking question to the students: "How do you nurture and transform for the world?" He emphasized that core values such as Quality, Integrity, Sustainability, Innovativeness, and Collaboration could empower students to bring out their best and make meaningful contributions globally. Prof. Ogola also advised students to take control of their academic and personal well-being, emphasizing the importance of time management and maintaining a balance between their social, economic, spiritual, and academic lives.



Student advising plays a vital role in the university experience by providing academic guidance and supporting personal and career growth. Advisors assist students in selecting courses, understanding degree requirements, and managing academic challenges. Advising also helps students explore career opportunities, understand job market trends, and find internships or research opportunities, ensuring that students are on track for their professional aspirations. Beyond academics, advisors often serve as mentors, helping students build life skills, emotional intelligence, and decision-making abilities. They also connect students to resources for mental health support, time management, and conflict resolution.

Prof. Sheila Wandera-Simwa, the Dean of the School, offered further guidance to the students. She counselled them to familiarize themselves with their departments and exam officers to navigate their academic journeys effectively. She encouraged students to read the Student Handbook and familiarize themselves with the university's rules and regulations, stressing the importance of maintaining academic integrity. Prof. Wandera-Simwa also emphasized the significance of attending classes regularly, meeting the 75 percent attendance requirement, sitting for Continuous Assessment Tests (CATS), and adhering to a respectful dress code. She concluded by urging students to take ownership of their academic progress, as the responsibility for success lies with both the individual and the institution.

Dr. Florence Opondo noted that access to lecture halls, a serious concern raised at the previous luncheon, had already been resolved, as the timetabling officer had allocated lectures with students with disabilities to accessible halls. She also encouraged members to raise awareness among more students and staff about the importance of self-acceptance by registering with the

Committee and the National Council for Persons with Disabilities (NCPWD. She reminded them of the importance of sharing information, as this can help resolve any arising matters quickly and efficiently.

PEACEKEEPING MISSION IN TIATY CONSTITUENCY, BARINGOEAST

Laikipia University embarked on a significant peacekeeping mission in Tiaty, Baringo East, from March 11th to 12th, 2025 to promote peace, foster unity, and environmental sustainability of the region. The mission included a series of interactive activities such as talks in schools, public barazas (community meetings), and a tree donation and planting initiative. The event was designed to engage various sectors of the community, including students, local leaders, and residents, in meaningful discussions and actions that would contribute to lasting peace and environmental awareness.

Objective of the Mission: The mission aimed to address the challenges of insecurity, environmental degradation, and community disengagement by fostering dialogue, cooperation, and environmental responsibility among residents of Tiaty and its surrounding areas.

The specific objectives were to:

- 1. Engage local schools in discussions about the importance of peace and coexistence;
- 2. Bring together community members through public barazas for dialogue on peaceful coexistence and conflict resolution; and
- 3. Promote environmental conservation through tree donation and planting activities.

Activities Held:

Talks in Schools: The mission commenced with visits to various schools in Tiaty, where representatives from Laikipia University, including faculty members and students, interacted with pupils and students from the area. The focus of the talks was to sensitize young people on the importance of peace, their role in building a cohesive society, and the significance of environmental conservation. Topics covered included *conflict resolution, the impact of violence on development*, and *how youths can contribute to sustainable peace in their communities*. Students were encouraged to become ambassadors of peace, embracing values such as tolerance, respect, and cooperation.

Public Barazas (Community Meetings): On the second day of the mission, public barazas were organized in key community centres in Tiaty. These forums served as platforms for open dialogue among community members, local leaders, and stakeholders. The discussions revolved around local security concerns, strategies for conflict resolution, and ways to strengthen peacebuilding efforts in the area. Local leaders expressed the need for continued collaboration between the community, government, and educational institutions in creating an environment where peace can thrive. The university representatives facilitated these discussions, ensuring that all voices were heard and that actionable strategies were outlined.

Dr. Hezron Nyamwega, Registrar (Administration and Human Capital), echoed these sentiments, underlining the role of capacity building in enhancing individual and institutional performance. He encouraged department heads to incorporate training needs assessments into their performance contracts to better align professional development with strategic goals. Dr. Nyamwega also reminded staff about the dangers of drug and substance abuse, urging everyone to prioritize their health and wellbeing for greater productivity.

n April 4, 2025, Laikipia University held a Drug and Substance Awareness Campaign at the University Graduation Pavilion. The event aimed to educate students on the dangers and consequences of drug and substance abuse while reinforcing the institution's commitment to promoting student health and well-being.

The campaign was officially opened by Ms. Evelyne Oketch, who is in charge of Counselling Services, on behalf of the Dean of Students. In her remarks, Ms. Oketch highlighted the increasing prevalence of drug use among students and its strong links to absenteeism, indiscipline, and a rise in mental health concerns. She reaffirmed the university's proactive approach to tackling these issues through continuous awareness and support initiatives.

Mr. Eliud Maina from the NACADA Laikipia County Office graced the event, representing the regional NACADA Coordinator for Laikipia, Nyandarua, and Samburu counties. He presented findings from NACADA's 2024 national survey on drug use among university students. He noted a concerning rise in cannabis use, reported to be five times higher than the national average, as well as a narrowing gender gap in alcohol consumption. He called for a coordinated, multi-stakeholder strategy to curb both the supply and demand of drugs in academic institutions.

A key highlight of the day was an Awareness Walk around the university campus and its environs. Ms. Oketch, representing the Acting Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Academic, Research and Student Affairs), officially flagged off the walk. Participants included university staff, NACADA officials, representatives from the Laikipia University Students Association (LUSA), student peer counsellors, members of the Anti-Drugs Club, and the broader student body.

During the event, students also voiced concerns about the rising trend of gambling, equating its effects to those of substance abuse. They urged organizers and stakeholders to expand awareness campaigns to address behavioural addictions as well.

The campaign marks a significant step in Laikipia University's ongoing mission to create a safe, healthy, and drug-free learning environment.
